There is **1** ballot that asks whether Alberta should remain in Canada or begin the process toward a future separation referendum.

There are **5** ballots aimed at delaying or restricting immigrants from accessing provincial programs and services like healthcare, education, and the Alberta Child and Family benefit.

And **4** additional ballots are meant to give Danielle Smith and the UCP government more power, free from federal oversight. This would allow her to appoint socially conservative judges, and opt out of important federal programs that Albertans rely on like the Child Care Subsidy, the National School Food Program and others.

These questions were not created by citizen petitions. They do not reflect Albertans' priorities. Public healthcare and public education need attention now. This referendum won't hire another nurse, reduce a surgery wait or put another teacher in a classroom.

To Move Forward **Vote Remain** in Canada & **Vote NO** on the other nine questions.

Let's separate the misinformation from the facts.

✗ MISINFORMATION

Immigration is to blame for Alberta's challenges.

✓ THE FACTS

Newcomers contribute to our communities and economy and help fill job vacancies. Canada is already reducing immigration, which will lower nominal GDP by \$37 billion between 2025 and 2027 and result in 1.3 billion fewer hours worked in 2027.

✗ MISINFORMATION

Taxpayers provide free healthcare and education to non-permanent residents.

✓ THE FACTS

Some government sources say non-permanent residents pay only \$150 million a year in taxes. In fact, they likely paid approximately \$800 million in combined federal and provincial taxes in 2025, not including GST or CPP/EI premiums.

✗ MISINFORMATION

There is too much immigration happening in Alberta.

✓ THE FACTS

Alberta had roughly 271,000 non-permanent residents as of January 2026. The majority are here working, a smaller number are studying and a small fraction are refugees. Recent policy changes have also drastically reduced incoming international immigration.

✗ MISINFORMATION

Immigrants are causing the strain on Alberta's healthcare and education systems.

✓ THE FACTS

Non-permanent residents use healthcare at much lower rates. Based on government numbers, the average non-permanent resident costs the system about \$1,800 a year compared with about \$9,500 for the average citizen. Most also pay taxes that help fund the system.

✗ MISINFORMATION

We can vote for separation just to send Ottawa a message.

✓ THE FACTS

Calgary businesses are already warning about the economic consequences. 63% say separation talk is negatively affecting their business, 48% say they would relocate outside Alberta if separation moves forward and 80% say the debate is negatively affecting Alberta's economy.

✗ MISINFORMATION

These votes will solve Alberta's problems.

✓ THE FACTS

Alberta ranked 10th of 13 for healthcare spending in 2025. Compared with Nova Scotia, which invests the most, Alberta spends over \$2,000 less per citizen. Alberta also spends the least on education among provinces, almost \$5,000 less per student than Quebec.

✗ MISINFORMATION

Alberta can opt out of federal programs and simply keep the money.

✓ THE FACTS

Federal funding supports major Alberta programs, including billions for the Child Care Subsidy, nearly \$43 million for the National School Food Program and \$1.3 billion for mental health services. Opting out raises a basic question: would those programs and that funding continue?

✗ MISINFORMATION

Alberta's biggest problem is the Constitution or its relationship with Ottawa.

✓ THE FACTS

Alberta is 10th of 13 provinces and territories in healthcare spending and last among provinces in education spending. Constitutional debates won't fix healthcare, education, affordability or grow the economy. Those are the problems Alberta needs to focus on.

What will this all cost?

Alberta's former Chief Electoral Officer has stated that the referendum will cost Albertans **\$130 Million dollars**.
